# A Letter from the Past

The following letter was sent to us by William Norris Reneau, San Antonio, TX. It was found among the papers of his grandfather, Isaac Tipton Alexander Reneau, Broken Bow, NE., and gives us a glimpse into this period in our country's history. William's Reneau lineage: Meredith Thurman Reneau, Isaac Tipton Alexander, Isaac Tipton, John, Charles Reno/Reneau, John Reno, Lewis Jr., Lewis Sr.

Mr. I. A. Reneau Broken Bow, Neb.

Dear "I.A."

Now don't faint or think this is from a gost for it is not, but from one that the Mexicans think is very much alive, though I have been reported missing & dead several times in the last two years, but so far have escaped any serious injury.

Have intended a great many times to write you to see how you & the family were but put it off, not writing to any one but the children. Often think of you & the happy past while sitting around a lone camp fire or on a trail, & wondered how every one is getting along, & if they have forgotten the "Rover," the Texas Ranger.

After Juanita married & I had no ties I took a long for my young life & the Mexican trouble started & I accepted a position in the Service & believe I have done some good, at least all those that know me say so. It is a grand life, plenty of exercise & excitement & every one you meet is eather your enemy or friend, no half-way. If an enemy, it is good night, if he beats you on the draw & the best shot.

During my service I have been on the Mexican border all the time from the Gulf to the New Mexico line & I have seen some close calls & lots of funn. (that's what we call it)

Am inclosing you a picture of myself & my old bay horse. Hw is my Pal, & companion. With him I can lay down at night & no one can come near without him giving the alarm & put him on a trail & he follows it like a trained dog & a Mexican cant come near him without getting kicked or bit. He has quite a war record, he is the hors that Genl Blanco rode when he captured Rynose & Motamorris three years ago & I got hold of him. There is no end to his durability & speed & so far has only received two slight bullet wonds. He thinks lots of me. It seems he can scent trouble for it is due him that I have been first on the alert many times & didn't get mine.

Things have been in bad shape in this part of the border & is no better now, only just quiet and organizing to come stronger. We soldiers in this work along the border in the brink is a joke. The bandets go all around them in the brush & they cant trail them..

We killed so many for shooting at us across the river that the War Department requested our Governor to keep us away from the river, this came about after 6 of us killed 32 out of 50 for shooting at us across the river at Covasar Crossing. They were on the bank of the river when they shot the first volley into us, (about 300 yards) the last one of them that fell was about 600 yds. They started to running after our first volley when 6 of them went the ways of the wicked, might have got more of them but at 600 yards they got to the brush & we are not allowed to cross the river after them.

Well guess you are tired of that stuff, so will try & change the subject & speak of the country. This is a fine country, equal to California. They can raise any thing, the finest Oranges & Grapefruit I ever ate. This place is in the heart of the Valley & has the best Cannal System. It would be a better country if it weren't for the land Sharks robbing the home seeker's . I have often wished you would get to come down on some of those home seekers excursions & look the country over. It is a very cheap trip. We are eating all kinds of fruit now, right off the trees. Sure would love to see you & talk with you.

I was in Houston about three month ago for a few days to see the children & my Grand-son. (Did you catch the Grand-son?) You ought to see him, he is a hunter & thinks his Gran-Dady is the proper thing.

Juanita did very well, she got a good boy of good family & he & all the family love her. Her mother-in-law is foolish about her & and baby.

If this reaches you & you can find time to write me a few lines I would certainly appreciate it & tell me how Beutell & every body is.

If there is anything you would like to know about this country or any of these land Sharks I can tell you for I know the food ones from the bad.

There is a good many Nebr. people in this valley but non that I have met that know you.

Well, "I.A." will close for this time as I know I have tired you & promis to be more brief next time & write on subjects that will interest you. Also want to write to the children today. Just got in last night & am leaving for a scout in A.M.

The two men were cousins—actually 3<sup>rd</sup> cousin once removed. I T's gg grandfather was Charles Reno, son of John Reno and Elizabeth Thorn Reno. T N's ggg grandfather was William Lewis Reno, son of John Reno and Elizabeth Thorn Reno. (John Reno and William Lewis Reno were brothers.)

**Historical note**: 1916 was the era of Poncho Villa in Mexico. As part of his revolt he wanted to provoke the US into a full scale attack so the Mexican government would fall and he would take power. Villa's forces caused many shooting incidents along the Rio Grande. Texas Rangers guarded the border and did shoot back. The letter clearly refers to border events of the period.

Genealogists Sue Damewood, Powell, TN and Leigh Wimberly, Leesville, LA provide some additional information about the two Reneaus:

Isaac Tipton Alexander (I A) Reneau was born Mar 11, 1859 in Thompkinsville, KY. The 1900 Custer County, NE census shows Isaac A. Reneau, his wife Clarissa, with 2 children, Meredith and Helen, living at home. He homesteaded on the South Loup River near Georgetown NE in 1884. He served four terms as postmaster. I A died Jan 20, 1952.

Thomas Nelson Reneau was born Feb 10 1868 in San Felipe, Austin Co., TX. He married Lillie Anna Bradshaw. The 1910 Harris County, Texas census lists T. N. Reneau, and his children, Juanita and Elmer living at home. T N's Reneau lineage is Thomas S. Reneau, James Butler, John Harris Reno, William Lewis, John, Lewis Jr., Lewis Sr.

# The History of First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ)

The Albany First Christian Church, from it's founding, has been an Ecumenical and Missionary group of people sent forth to practice and to teach others to practice the Gospel of Jesus Christ—to love God and to love one another. All are welcome to come and worship. It is cooperative within as all decisions are made by the majority of the members, including the calling of a Pastor/Minister. It belongs to the Brotherhood known as the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) participating at the local, regional, and world levels in its Educational, Evangelism, and Outreach programs. It gives to the several special Outreach offerings taken each year. It uses the materials for Church School and other things as the Christian Women's Fellowship, youth camp, and conference. Many youth and adults have attended camps, retreats, District, Regional and General Assemblies. It was most fortunate in 1947 to have one of the two Rural Laboratory Training Schools in the United States to trains teachers for leadership in the local Church with Mrs. Mossie Wyker as the Inspirational and Worship Leader. On the local level, the Church supports and participates in the work of the Clinton County Ministerial Association with the programs of the special ecumenical services at Easter and Christmas, helping in the Hospital and Nursing Home Chaplaincy programs and worship services, some ecumenical Vacation Bible Schools, the Nursing Home ministry of giving lotion to the residents at Easter, holding special services for the community such as Maundy Thursday and Christmas Eve Communion, and participating in joint Cantatas. It has served the community as a place where various groups can meet. Music teachers have held their recitals. and previously the Lions Club met two times per month with the Willing Workers fixing and serving meals. Currently, Narcotics Anonymous meets one time per week, and Alcoholics Anonymous meets two times per week. In the 1940s, the youth of the town and country had a place to go for a recreations

In the Jan/Feb 2007 issue of the Reno/Reneau Review, the article about "George Reneau, the Blind Musician of the Smokey Mountains," we asked our readers for information about the life and times of George. The following is provided by Sue Reneau Damewood, Powell, TN.

I received the newsletter today. My Dad (John Clyde Reneau) and my cousin, Charles,' Dad (George Harris



Reneau) knew George personally. Dad said that George came to see his family on several occasions and he (Dad) would take him to the bus station to go back to Knoxville. Dad bought several of his records. They were in an old photograph cabinet at

our Grandmothers. When she died, Charles got the photograph, the cabinet and all its contents. I asked Charles about the records so he brought them to the 2006 All Reno/Reneau Reunion in KY (and gave me a couple of them). I had never seen any of them until then. My records of George McKinney Reneau follow:

# Descendants of George McKinney Reneau

**1.** GEORGE MCKINNEY<sup>11</sup> RENEAU (JOSEPH RUSSELL<sup>10</sup>, SILAS<sup>9</sup>, WILLIAM BROWNLOW<sup>8</sup>, WILLIAM<sup>7</sup>, HEZEKIAH<sup>6</sup>, JOHN DAVID<sup>5</sup> RENO, JOHN<sup>4</sup>, LEWIS<sup>3</sup>, LOUIS<sup>2</sup> REYNAUD, LOUIS<sup>1</sup>) was born May 18, 1902 in Tennessee<sup>1</sup>, and died June 05, 1938 in Knoxville, TN of pneumonia<sup>2</sup>. He married ELSIE GREEN April 06, 1925 in Knoxville, TN, by H. L. Johnson, J.P.<sup>3</sup>. She was born 1900 in Tennessee<sup>4</sup>.

### Notes for GEORGE MCKINNEY RENEAU:

There was a George Reneau, age 7, b. TN, listed as an inmate at the Tennessee School for the Blind in Nashville, TN in 1910. It is possible it was George McKinney.

The 1930 Knoxville, Knox County, Tennessee, census (Knoxville, ED4, p. 1A) lists George M. Reneau, 27 b. TN, age 22 at first marriage, parents b. TN, musician, entertainer; Elsa J., wife, 31 b. TN, age 26 at first marriage, parents b. TN; Lawrence K., son, 12 b. TN; and Luese K., daughter, 10 b. TN [Lawrence K. and Luese K. were stepchildren and did not carry the Reneau name.]

He was originally buried in Pleasant Hill Cemetery in Jefferson County but was moved to Hills Union Cemetery when Douglas Dam and lake were built. His nickname was "Blind George."

The following is a portion of an article written by Jack Neely which appeared in Metro Pulse (Knoxville, Tennessee) on March 18, 1999, entitled "George Reneau on Guitar - The blind street musician who almost hit the big time"

"For years I've run across stray mentions of a Knoxville musician named George Reneau: put together, the fragments tell an intriguing, if incomplete story about one of those ghosts from the foggy dawn of country music.

"Just after World War I, this blind busker came from Jefferson County to make a living on downtown Knoxville

streets, playing guitar and harmonica, singing his songs for whomever would stop to listen. One who stopped was a man named Gus Nennsteil. He worked for Sterchi Brothers Furniture--regional purveyors of phonographs, and one of the most influential recording promoters in the South. Sterchi's sent Reneau to New York in spring, 1924, to make a record.

"On that trip Reneau became one of country music's first recording artists. As much as the Vocalion people liked Reneau's guitar playing and songwriting, however, they found his voice too rough. Vocalion got pop crooner Gene Austin-later famous for his smooth hit "My Blue Heaven"--to ghost Reneau's country-style vocals on these earliest recordings.

"At the time of that seminal trip, a George Reno lived at Maggie Guinn's boarding house up above the Army Bargain Store on Wall Avenue near Market Square. The city directory features four different spellings of his name, including Renaud; uncorrected misspellings must be a distinct hazard for the blind.

"Vocalion later let Reneau sing, himself, and he enjoyed a vogue as one of early country music's most prolific talents. Some of his songs became minor classics: "Wild Bill Jones," "Here, Rattler, Here," "Rovin' Gambler," "Wild and Reckless Hobo." Over a period of three years, he cut maybe 70 singles--but he didn't get rich. By 1926, confident enough to list himself as a "musician," and with his name spelled correctly, Reneau was living with his wife Elsie on Charles Place, an alley between State and Central that ended at the Presbyterian graveyard. He remained in Knoxville, living in cheap walkups with one-half addresses, still playing the streets.

"The Jazz Age didn't bode well for what Reneau did best. It was the era of the crooner, like Gene Austin. By the time he turned 27, George Reneau's day as a recording artist had come and gone. George Reneau's national career was over just before the recording sessions that gave Bristol its Congressionally sanctioned "Birthplace of Country Music" status

"Without a record contract, George and Elsie Reneau moved frequently, living for a time in South Knoxville, then above a grocery beside the Gay Street Bridge, then on the east side. The directories suggest that George and Elsie separated in the early '30s. They say he took his guitar to the streets every day until December, 1933, (sic) [The death date on George McKinney is June 5, 1938. I took it from his tombstone in Hills Union Cemetery.] when he came down with a bad cough and died days later, of pneumonia. He was 32."

family. Virgil married Annie Laura Erconbrock in 1913 in TX.



Annie was born Nov. 19, 1892 in TX. The couple had six children: Val C., Corrine, Juanita, Azalea, Douglas "Bill", and Kitty Ruth. The 1930 Federal Census records Virgil and Laura living in Carter Co., OK. Virgil worked as a machinist, and the family lived in OK, LA, and TX while the children were growing up.

Virgil Reneau passed away in 1974 in Falls Co., TX. His wife, Annie, passed away in 1975.

Later, Azalia wrote a tribute to her mother, describing the wonderful influence that this wonderful lady had on her children:

My Mother's Laughter Annie Laura Ercanbrach Reneau October 2, 1898 to February 22, 1975 contributed by Azalea Reneau Roos

I read with amusement recently that a psychiatrist has come forward with the "New" approach of learning to laugh at ourselves. He had used the deeply serious approach to his patients and therefore they took their problems imagined and real) too seriously, and therefore sank deeper into their neuroses. Then when he took to jollying them a bit, they responded in a like manner.

I did a bit of figuring on the amount of time and effort he took in arriving at this new approach to psycho-analysis. (pre-med training, medical school, years of psycho-analysis, practicing as a full fledged doctor, etc.) I guess he arrived at this startling concept after more than 20 years of education and practice.

Too bad he didn't have a mother like mine. This little woman, daughter of a sharecropper, who pick cotton and worked in the fields as a child and growing up, and who performed many other menial jobs during her marriage to supplement an inadequate income to maintain a home and raise six children. She only had six years of schooling, but she raised six children with love and discipline and laughed at hardships and problems. She prayed for guidance during the most difficult times (like during the Depression when there was too little to eat and she was too proud to apply for welfare.) But we all survived and grew up to become law abiding citizens and learned through her example to look at ourselves and see when we were taking our problems too seriously. Many times problems were serious and they were treated as such, but then, when they too passed, we could laugh again.

She never claimed the world, or her children, owed her anything. She never complained that life had treated her badly because she had to work hard for many years. She told, and enjoyed hearing funny stories about people and situations, and they frequently taught a lesson in humanity and humility, or the greatest was to just enjoy a good, rousing, roaring laugh for the sheer joy of living.

We lost our darling recently. We were not ready to give her up, however we were fortunate to have her until she was past 75 years of age and we shall miss her the rest of our lives. At her funeral service she had six grandsons as pall bearers, and as they deposited the casket on the bier at the graveside—each kissed his lapel flower and placed it gently on the casket as a last farewell gesture to their beloved "Granny".

The minister spoke a few last words of sympathy for us and reminded us that we had so much to remember. A young cousin stepped forward with tears streaming down her face, placed her hand on the casket and faced us all, but directed her words to the minister, and said, "Mr. Edwards, the one thing you don't know and what all of us will be remembering long after the other memories have faded, will be her laughter. And that laughter will be echoed in each home her presence has blest."

Commons (Oct. 14, 1916 – April 19, 1975); and Virgil Wallace Commons (Jul 10, 1918 – Mar 9, 2006).

Loyce married J. C. Mangrum in 1944. J.C. passed away on May 5, 1995. He was a Church of Christ minister.

Surviving are Loyce and J. C. 's daughter, Barbara Mangrum Summers and husband Steven Summers; granddaughters Bobbie Marie Summers Granbill and husband John Granbill, Christie Ann Summers Moses and husband Will Moses; great grandchildren Joh-Calab Alexander Gambill, Julie Marie Gambill, and Joshua Christian Moses.

Loyce enjoyed learning about her Reneau heritage, and contributed to the Reneau Book of Memories. In an article about her mother, Hettie Ann Reneau Commons, Loyce wrote that her mother "had a great love for her immediate family and her extended families. She was a member of the Church of Christ, and many times, in our home, had church quilting parties for families in need and the orphan home."

# We Remember...

The following is an excerpt from the Reneau Family Book of Memories that was compiled at the 2003 Reunion in San Antonio, TX. The article was submitted by Jack Evans Blake, Midland, TX.

Marion Tipton Rowland Blake's birth name was Minnie Tipton Rowland. She later changed her name to Marion. Marion was born to Mary Pitsey Depp Rowland and Wade W. Rowland on October 5, 1892 in Glasgow, KY. She had three sisters and one brother: Jessie Edna, Annette Eola, Stella Elva, and George Burks. In 1902 Wade Rowland moved his family to Hobart, OK, bringing them in a covered wagon. Before the family left Kentucky, Wade promised Mary Pitsey's mother, Mariba Reneau Depp, that he would bring his family back to Kentucky every three years. And, he kept his promise, so the Rowland children were able to know their family in Kentucky.

Marion's Reneau lineage begins as the daughter of Mary Pitsey Depp Rowland, granddaughter of Mariba Reneau Depp, and great granddaughter of Isaac Tipton Reneau.








# Welcome to Fort Worth, Texas!





# Help me find my Daddy, Charles Reno! From his daughter, Martha Ann Patton (Reno) McCarter

Here is a story which could touch your heart about a real live Reno who wants to become part of our family after not knowing for over 60 years that she was a Reno:


"Help me find my daddy, Charles Reno!" That is the plea of Martha "Marty" McCarter, 93206 First Street North, Pinellas Park, FL 33782, telephone 1.727.374.6704. Any Reno or Reneau who wants to write or call Marty to try to help will be welcome indeed. Let me tell you her story as nearly as I can the way she told it to me.

Marty was born December 26, 1939 in a Church of Christ in Christian Union Home for Unwed Mothers. A copy of her birth certificate shows the place of birth to be Vigo County, Indiana, and her parents to be Nancy H. Paxton and Charles Reno. They were not Indiana residents, but residents of Columbus, Ohio. Nancy was there only to have her baby. She had become pregnant while she was in high school and forced to quit school because the school at that time did not permit pregnant girls to attend school.

About four years later Nancy met and married a man who accepted Martha as his own and treated her like the other children he and Nancy had. That marriage worked so well that Nancy chose not to tell Marty about her birth, believing it might upset either Marty or her kind and loving stepfather. When Marty's step-father died and her mother was in failing health, Nancy called Marty to her bedside and told her that she could not go to her grave without telling her that her real biological father was not the man she had always

called Daddy, but was in fact, Charles Reno. Nancy told Marty that she would find a picture of her father in a dresser drawer with another young man. It was there, but it did not indicate which one was Charles Reno. (Photo at right) Nancy believed that both men enlisted in the US Navy before the start of World War II, and she never heard from him again.

In fairness to Charles Reno, Nancy never informed him of her pregnancy, so he could not have known he had a child. Nancy said that



Charles was a musician performing in the Columbus area where she met and dated him. He had mentioned several acquaintances and perhaps relatives around Washington Court house, Hillsboro, and other nearby Ohio towns. There are many Reno's there.

Marty is clear that she does not intend or want to make anyone uncomfortable, cause any family controversy, or seek any money. She just wants to find her Daddy, and believes that any half-brothers or sisters would be just as anxious to meet her as she would to meet them. She will

spend the rest of her life in the search. If you would like to help, please contact her. Think what a reunion it would be if she finds him!



# We Remember...

VICTOR ATLEE RENO, Sr., DECORATED VET, DIES AT 84

Highland County Jan 2, 1923, and died March 21, 2007 at age 84. He was united in marriage Aug 8, 1942 Helen June Wallace. Helen June Wallace Reno, died October 19, 2004 and





Resthaven Memorial Gardens, Hillsboro.

Victor was a decorated World War II veteran serving in the Army for four years, honorable discharged November 15, 1945. Among his several medals and ribbons were: American 1941-45 Campaign; carbine sharpshooter, efficiency, honor. fidelity ribbon, meritorious service. Most noteworthy among them is the Medal of Valor. Although Victor was in the

Army he worked for the Air Force, 619th AAF Base Unit, Patterson Field, as a maintenance mechanic where he became involved with a terrible plane crash. The inscription on his Medal of Valor reads as follows:

"MEDAL OF VALOR - a C-119 aircraft carrying 26 passengers and 5 crew members crashed on takeoff. Reno reported promptly to the crash site, equipped with hydraulic jack and acetylene cutting torch. The operation of these tools in lifting the collapsed fuselage enabled fire fighters to remove personnel. He also aced as a stretcher bearer in removing personnel and assisted in replenishing foam in the fire trucks. Such courage as that demonstrated by Mr. Reno reflects the highest devotion to duty and great credit upon himself and the civilian employees of the U.S. AirForce."

Following his military service Victor worked as a farmer, mechanic with the Highland County Highway Department and member of Reno Auto Parts, Route 50, Hillsboro, still operated by members of the Reno family. His favorite hobby was travel.

Victor leaves behind a family of 19. One sister, Mary Reno (Raymond) Berry is 87 and lives at Del Rio, Texas. His only son, Victor Atlee Reno Jr., is unmarried. His only daughter is Vicky Reno (Richard) Greene. grandchildren are Time Greene, Sue (Richard) Watson, and Brenda (Barry) Earley. Of his eight grandchildren, six are children of Sue Watson: Holly Hockstock, Caleb Lewber, Sierra Watson, Rachael Watson, Chervl Watson, and Richard Watson. The other two are Tim Greene's children:

Jared Greene and Sean Greene. He has two great-greatgrandchildren: Brodie Earley and Abigail Hockstock.

Victor's father was Joseph Reno, born October 3, 1873 (wife Dottie Lewis); grandfather, George Washington Reno (wife Nancy Compton); great grandfather, Sampson Reno, born June 25, 1807 (wife Eleanor Hastings); great-greatgrandfather, Thomas Reno (wife Sara Beaver); great-greatgreat-grandfather, Thomas Reno.

Victor Atlee Reno, Jr. is willing to exchange information with those who might be interested in his family. His working life was with Moore Drop Forge, Gross Gravel Company and Candlelight, from which he retired. He lives at 108 Sherwood Drive, Hillsboro, OH 45133, telephone number 1-937-393-1179. Some of the family members are buried in Butler Cemetery (Dunkard's Ridge) near Marshall, Ohio, and others in two cemeteries at Sinking Springs, Ohio, including Victor's great-grandfather George Washington Reno.



# A Happy Ending...

Two Reneau descendants were in the news recently when they were part of a search party of hundreds of volunteers and trained professional combing the

woods in search of a young 18 year old autistic man who had become separated from his parents during a hike in the wilderness

Jacob Allen became lost in the wilderness for four days and was found alive on October 18, weak but apparently fine. In an associated press release by Tom Breen, an account of finding Jacob follows:

"To the best of our knowledge, he was just hungry and thirsty and fatigued," **Jim Reneau**, one of the nine searchers who found Jacob Allen, said at a news conference at the command post near Davis, about 90 miles south of Pittsburgh....Allen, who wandered away from his parents while hiking Sunday, was found lying in a clearing about a mile from where his had was found Monday....(He) rolled over to meet his rescuers when Reneau's son, **Jeremy Reneau**, called out his name.

"He was very quiet, he was non-verbal," said Jeremy Reneau, 25, the first to spot Allen. "But you could tell by his body language he was hungry."

Rescuers fed him candy bars and peanut butter sandwiches and tried to walk him out of the wooded Dolly Sods Wilderness Area, part of the Monongahela National Forest. When he became too tired, they carried him out on a litter. Reneau said.

"The family is all together," search group spokesman Chris Stadelman said. "As soon as they heard the report he was alive and doing fairly well, they gathered in a prayer circle.

We would like to add our thanks to those who searched for Jacob Allen and especially to Jim and Jeremy Reneau who were instrumental in finding him.

# California Fires Come Close to Reneau Descendants

After attending the All RenoReneau Reunion in Fort Worth, May Sparks Comfort and daughter, Susan Comfort Estrada went home to San Diego, CA to deal with the terrible forest fires that were claiming many homes in the area during the month of October.

The following is an email that May wrote concerning the experience: Thanks for your concern, it is very appreciated. One of the friends that lost her home, said the outpouring from friends and family has been overwhelming. That's how I feel, I would hang up the phone Monday and yesterday and it would ring again. Susan was laughing about all the phone calls, she couldn't believe it either. I am located just south of Rancho Bernardo, the area that lost all the homes and businesses yesterday. I waited all day yesterday for the evacuation call, but it never came. Susan and Tony did get the call late last night and arrived here about 1 am after loading their trailer up. My car is packed and ready to go. I am in a little triangle at I-15 and State Highway 56 that is semi protected.

If any members fly over this way it will be bad. This area is packed with homes just like Rancho Bernardo, and they really had a lot of homes burn up there. I am located on a canyon so that is a little scary. Susan and Tony's home is also located near a canyon. The winds just come down the canyons and the fire with them. Our humidity was in the single digits yesterday, it is some what better today, although still low. So we are all just sitting around watching all of San Diego county burn up on the TV. They don't want people on the roads unless it is necessary. When I heard it was so close I dug out all the photo's I could fine, important files, special mementos, my Great Grandmother Sparks ewer, packed suitcases, and grabbed hanging clothes, ready to leave when told. It was really scary. The fire began about 30 + miles away on I think Sunday afternoon, (lost track of time as well), Monday morning it was already here, the winds were so bad, it just raced across the county during the night. All the firefighters we have in San Diego and related communities, were trying to fight it and it just moved too fast. Then because of the winds, and smoke, aircraft couldn't fly safely, so it just burned at will. They were able to get as much aircraft as they had available for dropping water and fire suppression Tuesday. Then today there was lots of aircraft help. But it is still burning furiously. We have firemen from all over California, Arizona and Verna Allen in Ruidoso N. M. said one of their trucks was on the way.

The weather is supposed to cool down, shore winds get back and our on to normal. The air in all of San Diego County is so polluted you can barely breathe. The sky looks like we have a thick fog. I have been so heartened by all the calls from relatives concerned about us, Texas, New Mexico, Utah and of course California. A lot of people, I know here, have been evacuated over 400,000 county wide. So far none I know have heard of that their homes burned. Since they are not letting people into the evacuated areas, no one knows. One of our old time TV announcers was watching his house burn while covering the fire from his area. So sad. We've heard over 500 to 1000 homes have burned so far and it is far from

THANK YOU for thinking and worrying about us. So far we and our 3 dogs are just fine.



Ed was born in Aaron, Kentucky on September 22, 1906. Ed's parents were Ulysses Simpson Grant Reneau and Cora Lutrell Reneau. He had five siblings: Richard Carvin Reneau, Elizabeth Pauline Reneau (Vickery), Beulah Reneau (Peercey), Raymond Borhing Reneau, and Robert Maurice Reneau. Ed is survived by his brother Robert.

The family celebrated Ed's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday last year at their home in Sterling Heights. He came to Michigan to work in the factory when he was 18 years old, but he remembered the pretty girl Bessie Wade, who lived across the street from him in Albany, Kentucky, and returned there to make her his wife when she was 18 and he was 22 years old. They were married on October 12, 1928.

Bessie was born in Cartwright, Kentucky on June 28, 1910. Her mother died when she was an infant, and she lived with an aunt and uncle in Albany, Kentucky until she married Ed.

Ed and Bessie settled in Detroit and eventually moved to St. Clair Shores and then to an apartment in Sterling Heights, where they have lived the past 4 1/2 years.

William Samuel Terry, IV



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
In 1981, Sam compiled a book about the life of Nettie Bayliss

Using slides, she talked of the history of this age-old art form, explained the kilns used and techniques. The enthusiastic audience had many question for her and were extremely interested in her potter techniques.

There she tells about her teaching philosophy, a gallery of her pieces, along with a resume of her background, listing education, awards and honors. It is a real treat to visit this website to learn more about this nationally known artist.

In her Artist's Statement, Davie writes: For the last ten years I have fired my pots from primarily in wood kilns. There is an insane amount of work involved in this process of firing and there are many easier process of finishing work. I am attracted to spontaneous ash deposits, flashing, and the beauty of naked clay exposed to raw flame. The mystery of unpredictable surfaces on the work intrigues me. I enjoy being physically involved in the firing process, not just doing passive turn-ups on a gas or electric kiln. I even like spending days cutting, hauling and stacking wood. They are as comfortable and familiar to me as the long, hot days I spent as a child working in my dad's tobacco and hay fields. I realized this is one of the reasons I'm so attracted to wood firing. There is an honesty and purity in intense physical labor directed toward an ultimate goal. This is the spirit I want my work to exhibit."

Doesn't get up from chair to eat, drink or go to the bathroom. Desk is a mess of printed newspaper articles, reference books, magazines, notes. Misses appointments. Phone is always busy while hooked up to genealogy boards. Out of touch with friends, unless fellow victims.

TREATMENT: Medication is useless. Disease is not fatal, but gets progressively worse. Patient should attend Family History Workshops, belong to genealogy forums, subscribe to genealogical magazines and be given a quiet corner of the house where he, or she, can be alone.

The nature of the disease is—the sicker the patient gets, the more he enjoys it!

# The History of First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) Albany, Kentucky

The First Christian Church of Albany, Ky. was founded as the The Church of Jesus Christ at Paoli, Ky. on December 21, 1834 with sixteen charter members. Raccoon John Smith, Campbellite Baptist preacher, who representing the Disciple faction, united with Barton W. Stone who represented the Christian faction on Dec. 25, 1832, influenced the charter members. Smith had come from the Stockton Valley area, and although left it to preach across a wide area, he returned to give much encouragement, pastoral leadership, and shepherding.

The first officers were elected on May 3, 1835. They were O.T. Ragland and Isaac T. Reneau as Elders and F.W. Talbott as Deacon. Furth organization took place on Feb. 5, 1836, when it was decided that the Church would meet on the first day of each week (Sunday) at 12:00 noon at the home of Rebecca Reno Talbott. F.W. Talbott was to lead the singing. Later, Isaac T. Reneau and J.H. Young were each given a letter of recommendation to other Churches, which for all purposes, was to make them Ordained Ministers. They were then recognized by others to preach. Isaac T. Reneau then was ordained as an evangelist and worked for the Kentucky Christian Missionary Society, which was the forerunner of the Christian Church in Kentucky. However, he continued to be involved in, and concerned about, the Christian Church at Paoli, having moved back to the old Wood homeplace so that he and his wife, Mary G. Wood Reneau could care for her mother during the Civil War. His children were active in the church at Paoli. His grandchildren and great-grandchildren were active in the Albany Christian Church, with the last of them being Betty Reneau.

It is not known the exact date of the Church moving to Albany. One theory is that it was after the founding of Clinton County in 1836. Albany became incorporated and became the county seat in 1837. A second theory is that it was after the death of Rebecca Reno Talbott on Sept. 1, 1845. A third theory is that it was after the Civil War when all the Churches and families had such a difficult time, especially with the guerilla warfare in the area. In 1873, property near the present Church was bought as shown in the deed recorded in the Deed Book C, page 527, by James M. Bristow, Clinton Court Clerk, from James M. Bristow to W. F. Harrison and B.F. T. Hancock, Deacons of the Church. A frame one-story building was erected and the First Christian Church began holding services.

In March 1926, the entire block on the south side of the courthouse burned when a fire began on the opposite corner of where the present Church is now located. It first burned up the street that is now Washington Street, then the street behind the courthouse, Jefferson Street, and back down Cross Street where the Church sat to the corner of Cross and Water Street. The Church building, at this time, was located between two residences and a bit North of where the present building is located. All of the buildings on the three streets were of wood and with no water supply or fire department

available, all burned to the ground. The Church was one of the last structures to burn, giving its members and friends time to carry out all of its furnishings and even pry out its windows. These windows had small colored sections of glass around the larger center glass in each section. Also the bell from the steeple was removed. Everything was stored in the top floor of the Albany Mill owned by Plato Hancock. The pulpit and Communion table was made by Bro. Reuben Smith and are still in use today. The Church made plans to meet in the county Courthouse for both Sunday School and Church until a new Church was built and ready for occupancy.


